The coat of arms of the City of Szczecin

Szczecin, the capital of the West Pomerania region, is one of the biggest cities in Poland, covering the area of 300 km² with population of nearly 400 000 people. The town on the river Odra is located in northwest Poland, a few kilometres from the border with Germany and ca. 90 km from the Baltic Sea coast. With its location ca. 140 km from Berlin and ca. 100 km from the ferry terminal in Świnoujście, Szczecin lies on the crossroads of routes linking east-west and north-south regions of Europe. The small distance from the coast has an influence on the marine character of the

town, which attracts visitors with its wide boulevards, vast green areas, rare plants, unique architecture and interesting street layout.

Although its history started in 1243, the town has a young face of a student town with a specific cultural atmosphere. Sea Days, 8 Students' Days, Kontrapunkt theatre festival, Szczecin Music Fest or Jazz Festival are just few of the annual events held here. The town hosted the Finals of Tall Ship Races 2007, 2013 and 2017 and its going to host another final in 2021.

It was also one of the candidates for the European Capital of Culture 2016. Szczecin sometimes called a green city has a total of more than 500 hectares of urban green areas including 15 parks, 90 lawns, cemeteries and urban forests.

Szczecin largest Kasprowicza's Park together with Jasne Błonia, Botanical Garden and Forest Park and Arkona Dendrological Gardens creates great green complex stretching from the city center to the Wkrzańska Forest.

West Pomeranian Voivodeship - a voivodeship located in the north-western part of Poland, on the coast of the Baltic Sea. It borders in the east with the Pomeranian Voivodeship, in the south with the Wielkopolskie and Lubuskie voivodeships, and in the west with the German federal states: Brandenburg and Mecklenburg-Vorpommern. It covers an area of 22 892.48 km², and on June 30, 2021, it had approximately 1.7 million inhabitants. The seat of the voivodeship authorities is Szczecin. It is the westernmost voivodeship in Poland.

The voivodeship was established in 1999 in connection with the reform of public administration, in place of the former voivodships: Szczecin and Koszalin, as well as parts of the voivodships: Slupsk, Pila and Gorzow. The name refers to the historical West Pomerania.




Coat of arms of the West Pomeranian Voivodeship

Szczecin has a rich and interesting history. Over the years it has been ruled by Poland, Germany, Sweden, Denmark and France; it had also been a capital city of Pomeranian Duchy. As you travel around the city, you are sure to find echoes of past rulers. Szczecin deftly combines the old with the new, so expect a modern takes on old buildings, as well as wonderful contemporary architecture.

11 Visit Szczecin's hallmark – the Chrobry Embankment (ger. Hakenterrasse). This is where you can find the city's most recognisable buildings: the headquarters of the West Pomeranian Provincial Office, the National

Museum and the Maritime University. It is a good idea to book a tour of the West Pomeranian Provincial Office building - to discover the secrets hidden in its basement depths.

- Visit the amazing interiors of Villa Lentz. Throughout its long history, the sumptuous residence has been home to private art collections, barracks, a seat of the church administration, a youth palace, and today - having regained its former splendour - it serves a thriving cultural institution. Aleja Wojska Polskiego 84
- Marvel at the architectural icon of the city the Mieczysław Karłowicz Philharmonic building. It is a great place to visit, not only for those who love music, but anyone interested in photography and design as well. In 2015, the Philharmonic was honoured by the European Union with the prestigious Mies van der Rohe Award for the best contemporary building, meaning it was considered to be the most beautiful building in the Old World. And this is only one of the many awards the building has received 48 Malonolska St
- Step down into the underground Upheavals Dialogue Centre, and discover Szczecin's path to freedom. Similar to the Philharmonic, the Centre has won prestigious prizes in architectural contests. In July 2016, it was named the best public space in Europe. Four months later, on 18 November, it was named the World Building of the Year, 1 Plac Solidarności St.



- Traverse the courtyards of the Pomeranian Dukes' Castle, feel like a member of the noble House of Griffins, and peek into the Witch's Cell. 34 Korsarzy St.
- Watch a movie with a glass of wine and the accompaniment of a pianist in one of the oldest cinemas in the world. The Pionier cinema has been active for more than 100 years. All films are played in their original language versions, so there is a good chance of finding something

to suit your taste! 2 Wojska Polskiego St.





Municipal Athletics Stadium Wiesław Maniak in Szczecin. It is located at ul. Litewska 20, at the Zawadzkiego-Klonowica estate (access: by buses no. 53, 60, 75, 80, trams no. 1 and 9). Since March 1998, the owner of the facility is the commune of the City of Szczecin and it is administered by the Municipal Sports, Recreation and Rehabilitation Center in Szczecin.

After World War II, he served the Military Sports Club Wiarus, and from the 1970s - the Budowlani Szczecin sports club. In December 2001, the City Council of Szczecin adopted a resolution to name the stadium after Wiesław Maniak, which happened on April 20, 2002, during the ceremonial opening of the facility after a thorough modernization. The stadium has a PZLA certificate entitling it to play international athletics competitions in accordance with the IAAF criteria.

The Polish Athletics Championships were held at the stadium three times: in 2002, 2008 and 2014, as well as Pedro's Cup athletics meetings with many outstanding and titled athletes in 2008 and 2009. From 2011 to 2017, the athletics memorial of Janusz Kusociński was held at the stadium Since 2018. the Wiesław Maniak Memorial has been held at the stadium.

Open athletics stadium:

- 8-lane tartan track, 400 m long, with a water ditch
- javelin, hammer and discus throw, shot put
- Pole vault jumps, long jump jumps and triple jumps
- covered stands with a capacity of 1638 seats
- · artificial lighting, sound system, monitoring

Wiesław Maniak - History

Wiesław Jan Maniak (born May 22, 1938 in Lviv, died June 28, 1982 in Kurczatów, USSR) - Polish athlete, Olympic medalist and European champion. He specialized in sprinting, especially in the 100m run. He spent his youth in Great Britain and Ireland, where his father lived. He came to Poland in 1963.

At the 1964 Olympics in Tokyo, he was 4th in the 100m final as the best of Europeans (he lost only to black runners). He won a silver Olympic medal in the 4x100 m relay race (with Andrzej Zieliński, Marian Foik and Marian Dudziak). At the 1966 European Championships in Budapest, he won in the 100 m race. Maniak took 4th place in the 1968 European Indoor Championships in Madrid in the 50 m race. During the Olympic Games in Mexico 1968 he did not achieve individual successes, while he was in the 4x100 m relay race. In the final (8th place). He also participated in the European Championships in Helsinki in 1971.

He was the champion of Poland four times in 100 m (in 1965, 1966, 1967 and 1971) and once in 200 m (in 1965). He represented the colors of Legia Warszawa, Pogoń Szczecin and Skra Warszawa. He died while working on a contract to build a power plant in the USSR.

His Polish 100 m record from 1965, amounting to 10.1 seconds, lasted 19

years to 1984. During the Summer Olympics in Tokyo (October 15) he achieved a result of 10.15 seconds. Unfortunately, it could not be recognized as a Polish record due to too strong wind (+5.3 m/s). Same as the result of 10.0 s. Obtained 3 years later in Poznań (June 24, 1967, wind +2.8 m/s)






